Edwin R. Moore was born September 14, 1927 to Orlo Harry Moore and Elva Gertrude Moore at his grandparent's farm at Palmyra, Kent County, Ontario, Canada. He was married twice to Dorothy Stanley Moore whom he divorced and second to Stella Juanita Bishop Danbury. Both spouses preceded him in death. He gave away all of his carvings, as they were labors of love. He died at home on February 14, 2014, at age 86, of cancer.
