Jean Odette Culbertson, 86, of Fort Collins, died April 2, 2009 at Pathways Hospice Unit at McKee Medical Center in Loveland. Mrs. Culbertson was born July 12, 1922 in Golden, Colorado to Seymour Warren and Odette Waite Warren. Jean married William "Bill" R. Culbertson in March of 1942. Jean was recently honored by Poudre Valley Hospital for over 20, 000 hours of volunteer work at the hospital. She started her volunteer work in October of 1984.
